Newark Board of Education Deputy Superintendent Nicole T. Johnson is a talented educator, respected leader, and committed advocate for equity in education. Deputy Johnson has over 25 successful years of experience in public education and she leads with a heart for service and always keeps students at the center of every decision. Under her leadership as Deputy Superintendent, Deputy Johnson has overseen the streamlined reorganization of the District's Office of Academic Services, including the development of robust Offices of Teaching and Learning, School Leadership Teams, and Staff Development. Deputy Johnson has also led the district's design and implementation of its tenyear strategic plan, *The Next Decade: 2020–30*, which prioritizes equity, access, and achievement for all Newark students.

Deputy Johnson began her teaching career at the Marie Katzenbach School for the Deaf, and a few years later joined The Newark Board of Education at the Bruce Street School for the Deaf. For the next several years, she was appointed to many central office positions including Resource Teacher, Master Coordinator, and Literacy Supervisor. In 2010, she joined Elliott Street School as a Vice-Principal and three short years later was appointed as Principal of the same school.

As Principal, Deputy Johnson had the distinguished honor of opening up the brand new Elliott Street School building. Under her leadership, Elliott Street School implemented the highly successful Blended Learning program. This educational program combined online digital content with traditional classroom methods, and allowed students to receive individualized instruction on a daily basis. The school's enrollment doubled and the school was the recipient of many grants and national partnerships, including My Very Own Library. Through this initiative, hundreds of students and families expanded their home libraries.

Deputy Johnson specializes in school leadership development. She works closely with school and district leaders in the areas of professional learning communities, systems thinking, and school improvement through strategic planning. She currently serves as adjunct faculty at Montclair State University, teaching graduate courses to aspiring school leaders. Her expertise in the field of leadership has led her to be sought by national organizations as a presenter. Deputy Johnson also serves on several nonprofit boards, all dedicated to improving education and community. In 2018, Deputy Johnson was selected as one of Newark's Living Legends in Education by the Mayor and City Council of Newark, NJ.

Deputy Johnson is an active member of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Incorporated[®]. Her proudest accomplishments and joys of her life are her two sons Taji and Jordan. Taji is a graduate from the University of Delaware and currently resides in Los Angeles, California, and Jordan is a senior at Temple University.

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan is a proud product of a New Jersey public school education. She is also a passionate educator and an inspirational public speaker. Most recently, Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan served the New Jersey Department of Education as the Interim Executive County Superintendent for Morris County. She welcomes the opportunity to join an organization with the goal of strengthening teaching, leading, and learning in order to increase educational equity for New Jersey's 1.4 million students.

A parent of three, Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan has also served on the Montclair Board of Education, where she focused her expertise in the area of special education. She also volunteered as a PTA Executive Board member while her children were in elementary school, coordinating fundraising efforts and promoting parental involvement in all facets of school.

Acting Commissioner Allen-McMillan holds a bachelor's degree in industrial and labor relations from Cornell University, and she earned a master's in educational administration, as well as a doctorate in education, leadership, management and policy, from Seton Hall University.

She has served as trustee for the County College of Morris and as a board of education member of the Morris County School of Technology. She has received numerous awards, and has been featured in many publications ranging from local news outlets to U.S. News & World Report. She continues to be involved with her alma mater, such as assisting with alumni relations and serving on the Cornell University Library Advisory Council. One of her greatest joys professionally was serving as a mentor for aspiring administrators through New Jersey Leaders to Leaders, the state-approved comprehensive mentoring and induction program for new school administrators.

Michellene Davis assumed the role of President and Chief Executive Officer of National Medical Fellowships, Inc., (NMF) in May of 2021. Founded in 1946, NMF was one of America's first diversity organizations and remains the only national organization advancing health equity at the intersection of wealth and health. It provides scholarships to Black, Indigenous, People of Color (BIPOC) medical and health professions students underrepresented in medicine to ensure equity of access to culturally competent, high-quality health care. NMF also increases the number of BIPOC clinician leaders to diversify clinical trials.

Davis is named among Modern Healthcare magazine's Top 25 Most Influential Minority Leaders in Healthcare and Becker's Hospital Review's Top113 Great Leaders in Healthcare 2022 and 75 Black Healthcare Leaders to Know 2022. The National Association of Health Services Executives awarded her their 2021 Senior Health Care Executive Award.

Davis most recently served as Executive Vice President and Chief Corporate Affairs Officer at RWJBarnabas Health, the largest academic medical center system in New Jersey and one of the largest in the nation. She founded Social Impact and Community Investment, an equity-centered, policy-led community health practice addressing the social and political determinants of health. She was the first African American in state history to serve as Chief Policy Counsel to former New Jersey Governor Jon S. Corzine, the first African American and only the second women to serve as New Jersey State Treasurer. She was the youngest person to serve as CEO of the New Jersey Lottery and also served as a senior policy advisor in the New Jersey Department of Health and Senior Services.

She co-authored *Changing Missions, Changing Lives: How a Change Agent Can Turn the Ship and Create Impact,* published by ForbesBooks in 2020, which provides a blueprint for those committed to leading systems change within organizations.

Ms. Davis began her legal career as a trial litigator, is an Honors graduate of Seton Hall University and holds a Juris Doctorate from Seton Hall School of Law. She holds Executive Education Certificates in Corporate Social Responsibility from the Harvard Business School and in Social Impact Strategy from the Wharton School of Business.

LaChan V. Hannon, Ph.D. is a former high school teacher and the current Director of Teacher Preparation & Innovation in the Department of Urban Education at Rutgers-Newark. Dr. Hannon received her Ph.D. from Montclair State University in teacher education and teacher development with a focus on parent engagement and culturally responsive school practices. Her scholarly work investigates the intersectionality of race, disability, and parent involvement as they relate to the professional development for school leaders and educators. Her research and teaching interests are on culturally responsive school/parent partnerships, teacher self-study, and teaching for social justice. Her TEDx Talk titled Young, Gifted & Black with Autism was released in 2016. Dr. Hannon has published articles and chapters in academic texts including: International Handbook of Self-Study of Teaching and Teacher Education Practices, Contemporary Justice Review, and Journal of Autism and Developmental Disorders.

Dr. Hannon graduated from the University of Delaware in 1999 with a Bachelor of Arts in English and a minor in Sociology. Through an intentional course of study, Dr. Hannon simultaneously pursued and received special education graduate certificates in Educating Individuals with Autism and Applied Behavior Analysis from the Pennsylvania State University in 2009, which have impacted her both professionally and personally. Dr. Hannon and her husband Dr. Michael D. Hannon co-founded the 501c3 non-profit organization Greater Expectations Teaching and Advocacy Center Inc (GETAC) as a means to support families of children with developmental differences in addition to education professionals through parent workshops, professional development, and advocacy support.

After spending seven years as a high school teacher and desiring to broaden her professional skill set, Dr. Hannon transitioned into early intervention services as a teacher for preschool children with developmental disabilities. She then accepted a position as the county-wide behavioral health and rehabilitative services program director that provides behavioral and mental health services to children and adolescents with diagnosed disabilities between the ages of 3-19. In 2012, Dr. Hannon returned to the classroom with a professional focus on increasing teacher confidence and knowledge working with students with disabilities in educational settings. In 2013, she completed a Master's Degree in Educational Leadership/Teacher Leadership from Pennsylvania State University.

Currently, Dr. Hannon presents at both local and national conferences on topics of autism education, culturally responsive school practices, and educational leadership. Dr. Hannon is an advocate for equitable access to quality education, a supporter of teacher learning, and a believer that schools improve when they intentionally engage families and communities in the education of their children.

Principal Rosa Branco is a creative, kind-hearted educator that has served the children of Newark for the past 25 years.

Principal Branco was born and raised in Newark and put her leadership skills to use at a young age while helping to run her family's business in the Ironbound section of Newark. While working through her college years at Kean University, she changed majors from Elementary Education to Arts Education. Always having a passion for the arts, Principal Branco determined she could have the best of both worlds teaching the visual arts.

After teaching art to the students of Roberto Clemente Elementary School in the North Ward for about 3 years, she was encouraged to go back to school to obtain a masters in Educational Leadership by her principal at the time, Margarida Carrasco. Upon completion of her masters at Kean University, Principal Branco worked as a Facilitator at Gladys Hillman Jones Middle School for a year. She was then promoted to Vice Principal at Luis Muñoz Marín, followed by a year as Vice Principal at Dr. E Alma Flagg.

Principal Branco then served as Vice Principal at McKinley Elementary School when Gladys Hillman Jones combined with McKinley, making McKinley school a Prek-8th grade school. Principal Branco worked at McKinley for six years and then transitioned to Chancellor Elementary in the South Ward, where she continued as Vice Principal for five years. Next Principal Branco returned to the North Ward as Vice Principal at First Avenue Elementary School and was then promoted to Principal. She has been the Principal of First Avenue for the past five years. Under her leadership, they have won 1st place in the math olympics twice. Students have consistently ranked high academically in the district. This year they started their first Algebra course and won 2nd place in the nationwide Khanathalon. Grants awarded to First Avenue include "VH1 Save the Music," "Lang Lang," and Victoria Foundation grants 3 consecutive years for STEAM.

Principal Branco believes greatly in the children of Newark, dedicating her entire career to educating them and creating a culture in her building that entices children and teachers to want to come to school. First Avenue has provided Principal Branco the opportunity to use not only her leadership, but also her artistic background. She has been able to create an environment where students excel academically and artistically. Young artists shine at First Avenue Elementary School!

She was honored to serve on the Executive Board of Directors for MEMSPA (Michigan Elementary and Middle School Principals Association) as the Professional Development Chair and is on the NAESP (National Association of Elementary School Principals) Editorial Advisory Board.

Allyson writes on a blog called Serendipity in Education and is a best-selling author of several books-including <u>Leading the Whole Teacher</u>, The Path to Serendipity, the picture book <u>The Princes of Serendipity</u>. She consults with religious, community-based, and non-profit organizations, public and private schools, as well as with private groups. As a trauma expert, she offers consultation to organizations that want to become trauma-informed. She furthermore specializes in issues that form at the intersection of trauma and race.

Dr. Swift is actively involved in racial social justice efforts and initiatives. Her extensive volunteer work typically benefits the Black community specifically, and oppressed and under-served populations, in general. Her volunteer activity often involves grassroots and civic organizing, personal and community empowerment building, and addressing issues of racial inequality, and racial trauma.

Dr. Swift serves as a member of the Board of Advisors for Volunteers of America, the Newark Community Collaborative Board, Torchlight Educational Academy, and the Union County Juvenile Conference Committee under the Family Division of the Superior Court. Since 2014, she has also served as an executive board member for the New Jersey Chapter of The Association of Black Psychologists and is the immediate Past President of the chapter. Dr. Swift additionally serves on the National Board of The Association of Black Psychologists as Eastern Regional Representative.

Dr. Swift's special interests include youth empowerment, race and social issues, and holistic health.

Principal Genique Flournoy-Hamilton is a compassionate educator committed to serving youth from the city of Newark.

Principal Hamilton is a product of Newark Public Schools. She attended and graduated from Camden Middle School and University High School in Newark, NJ. Her diligence as a scholar athlete at University High School afforded her a four-year Presidential Scholarship to Tuskegee University, one of the nation's best historically Black universities.

While attending Tuskegee University, Principal Hamilton was honored as a Gates Millennium Scholar, Pi Sigma Alpha honor society member, United Negro College Fund Scholar, and Tuskegee University's Scholar Athlete of the Year. She graduated Magna Cum Laude from Tuskegee University with a BA in Political Science and English.

Principal Hamilton furthered her academic career at Rutgers University Graduate School of Social Work and School Counseling. She earned a master's degree in Social Work and began her career as a school social worker in Newark. She later earned a certificate in Educational Leadership, eventually leading to her obtaining a position as a Vice Principal and later Principal at a charter school in Newark, NJ. In August 2019, she returned to University High School, her alma mater, to serve as Principal. She currently continues to serve as Principal there and prides herself in increasing the academic outcomes at the school.

During her first three years as Principal, the English Language Arts state assessment scores rose by twenty-six percent. In addition, University High School expanded the college-in-high-school course offerings and became the first Newark Public School to offer dual enrollment courses with a Historically Black College or University, Howard University. In addition, the school has college partnerships with Brown University, Montclair State University, New Jersey Institute of Technology, Rutgers University, and Essex County College.

Principal Hamilton has been recognized by the National Sorority of Phi Delta kappa, Inc., Delta Pi Chapter and the Clergy Alliance for her educational contributions in the city of Newark. Principal Hamilton is a firm believer that every scholar is gifted with varied intelligences and it is the job of the educational ecosystem to support them in discovering these gifts and maximizing them to become local, state, and global leaders.

Dr. Chris T. Pernell is a dynamic physician leader and social change agent. In her public health practice, she focuses on health justice, community-based advocacy, and population-wide health promotion and disease prevention. Previously, she worked at University Hospital in Newark, New Jersey as the first Chief Strategic Integration and Health Equity Officer. She oversaw a portfolio which included Population Health, Strategic Planning, Community Affairs, and the Human Experience. Her office was responsible for launching health equity strategy development and integrating diversity, equity, inclusion, and antiracism initiatives across all system operations.

Prior to joining University Hospital, she led the 1199SEIU/League Labor Management Initiatives (LMI) Workplace and Community Health Program. Working with 1199SEIU leaders and frontline workers—the nation's largest healthcare union—and executive partners across NYC healthcare institutions, her efforts centered on workplace health strategies, worker empowerment, health equity, and health system transformation.

Dr. Chris is a charismatic and leading voice in preventive medicine and public health. The New Jersey Public Health Association recently awarded her the Dr. Ezra Mundy Hunt Award for her distinctive leadership in public health. In 2022, NJBiz chose her as one of the Best 50 Women in Business. ROI-NJ named her a ROI Influencer in their Women in Business roster as well. The American College of Preventive Medicine (ACPM) selected her to receive the 2022 Volunteer of the Year Award and the Ron Davis Special Recognition Award in 2021. Also, NJBiz named her a 2020 Public Health Hero. Dr. Pernell has spearheaded issues such as prison reform, care for justice-involved populations, evidence-based wellness programs, civic health, and high-quality education. Known for her community work in the Greater Newark, New Jersey area, she serves on the Essex County Civilian Task Force as a medical expert. Dr. Pernell is a frequent contributor across television, radio, and print media leveraging her lived experiences and expertise as a public health physician and health equity champion. She regularly speaks at professional symposia and social forums and advises community, state, regional, and national leaders on health equity, racial justice, population health, community well-being, and faith-based initiatives.

Dr. Chris graduated cum laude from Princeton University before attending Duke University School of Medicine. She received her Master of Public Health from the Columbia Mailman School of Public Health and completed the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health General Preventive Medicine Residency. Dr. Pernell is a fellow and Regent-at-Large for the American College of Preventive Medicine. She holds an appointment as a Clinical Assistant Professor at the Rutgers New Jersey Medical School. Previously, she taught as an adjunct associate professor at the NYU College of Global Public Health. She labors as a faith leader in a groundbreaking assembly, BET HaSHEM YHWH Worldwide Ministries, and travels domestically and overseas helping to transform lives through love, truth, creativity, and inspiration.
